ORGAN DONATION COMMON QUESTIONS

Though 95% of adults support organ donation, only 58% are actually signed up as donors, according to organ donor.gov. Much of this likely stems from hesitation due to concerns about the level of care people may receive in an emergency situation, as well as how their organs (and bodies for that matter) will be used.

Who can be a donor?

While many people think they aren't able to donate organs because of age or medical conditions, organ donor.gov explains that all people should consider themselves potential organ and tissue donors - regardless of age, health, race or ethnicity. Organ health is the most important factor. Doctors will examine your organs and determine whether they are suitable for donation. Only few conditions would absolutely prevent a person from becoming a donor - such as active cancer or a systemic infection.

In Ohio, all people obtaining or renewing a driver's license or ID card will be asked if they would like to be an organ, eye and tissue donor. Parental or guardian consent is required if a child under the age of 18 dies and becomes eligible to donate.

How will my organs be used?

According to Lifebanc, Northeast Ohio's nonprofit organ and tissue recovery organization, organs from donors will first and foremost be considered for use for transplantation. Transplanting to save lives is the priority. If, however, the organ is not able to be used for a transplant, it can legally be considered for use in research. However, there are strict rules and procedures for doing so.

Will my care be compromised?

The medical team attempting to save your life in an emergency situation is different than the transplant team. According to organdonor.gov, only after brain death has been confirmed (which is more than a coma) and the time of death noted, can organ donation become a possibility.

Can I still be embalmed and have an open casket?

An open casket funeral is usually possible for organ, eye, and tissue donors. Organs and tissues are recovered by a team of skilled clinicians in a manner that respects a family or donor's funeral wishes, including an open-casket viewing.

SVICKOVA (BEEF SAUERBRATEN)

Marinate:

- 1 large onion, sliced
- 2 stalks celery, chopped
- 1 carrot, sliced
- 1/4 cup vinegar
- 1-1/2 cups water
- 1 Tb. Salt
- 6 Allspice
- 10 peppercorns
- 2 bay leaves

Boil together all above ingredients; cool. Have ready 4 to 5 lbs boneless rump or chuck roast. Pour vegetables and marinade over meat, and refrigerate for 2 days. Butter roasting pan. Remove meat from marinade and put in pan. Put 2 Tb. butter over top and bake at 350° in a covered pan for 1 hour. Add some vegetable and part of strained juice. Cover and roast until tender. Strain brine; add more juice or water to brine for gravy. If you want it less sour, use water. Beat 4 Tb flour with 1 pint sour cream and add to brine to make gravy.

ROHLICKY (VANILLA HORNS)

2 1/4 cups flour 1/2 lb. butter 1 cup powdered sugar Grated rind of one lemon 3/4 cup (4 oz.) ground almonds 1 tsp. vanilla 2 egg yolks

Mix flour and butter as for pie crust. Add rest of the ingredients and mix thoroughly. Take a piece of dough about the size of a walnut and roll into a triangle. Form horns from this and bake at 350 degrees until light brown. While horns are warm, roll in vanilla flavored powered sugar.

These horns may be tied with bright ribbon and hung on the Christmas tree.

INCOMING

NOVEMBER 17

November 17 is not at all just an ordinary day in the Czech Republic - it is a state/public holiday - the Day of a Struggle for Freedom and Democracy.

On October 28, 1939, the anniversary of the independence of the Czechoslovak Republic, Czech students took to the streets to protect against Nazi occupation. Shots were fired into the crowd. Student leader Jan Opletal was seriously wounded and later succumbed to his injuries. His funeral became a huge demonstration against the occupiers. A violent reaction swiftly followed. On the night of November 16, the Nazis closed down Czech universities. Soon afterward, nine students were executed and 1,200 were sent to Sachsenhausen concentration camp. Before the war had ended, November 17 had been named international day of students.

Exactly 50 years later, on November 17, 1989, around 15,000 students gathered in Prague to honor the memory of Jan Opletal. The Communists had granted permission for a procession that would end at the national cemetery at Vysehrad. Despite instructions from police, students continued on into the centre of Prague to voice their opposition to the anti-reform policies of the Communist leadership and demanded the resignation of the country's communist government.



November 17, 1989 set in motion the Velvet Revolution which led to the peaceful overthrow of the communist regime in Czechoslovakia.

Following a brutal police crack-down on unarmed student demonstration in Prague on that day, thousands of people took to the streets, asserting their desire for change.

The Communist Party of Czechoslovakia finally announced on November 28 that it would step out. As a result, the first democratic elections since 1946 were held in June 1990 and brought the first completely noncommunist government to Czechs and Slovaks in over 40 years.

120 YEARS ST. JOSEPH SOCIETY NO. 156

In 1899 a small group of Czech immigrants living in the Broadway E. 55th or Zizkov Area met in Cleveland, Ohio with the idea of founding a fraternal and benevolent society. Being new to the United States they were hesitant about taking out insurance with a commercial company in the event of the death of a family member. Thus, St. Joseph as well as all other death benefit societies of all nationalists were founded. Each member contributed a per capita tax upon the death of a fellow member. Needless to say this was not a very business-like procedure.

St. Joseph Society also aided any worthy project whether religious or civic in nature. Citizenship classes were organized. A singing and dramatic society was formed at Our Lady of Lourdes Church mainly by St. Joseph members. St. Joseph members likewise formed the nucleus of the Catholic Sokol or Orel at Our Lady of Lourdes.

When the First World War broke out, St. Joseph members along with other societies worked with the National Alliance of Czech Catholics in providing men and supplies for the cause of Czech and Slovak Independence.

As the Czech and Slovak settlers moved from Zizkov to Fleet (Karlin), E. 131st, and Maple Heights, the membership also became scattered. The Depression also had an effect upon the strength of the membership. The State of Ohio Insurance Department insisted that all policies be based on sound actuarial practices. During the 30's, the Cleveland Men's Union under the leadership of Msgr. Oldrich Zlamal and Chas. J. Hronek merged into the Czech Catholic Union which was basically a women's organization founded in St. Wenceslaus Parish (E. 37th & Broadway) in 1879. This was most fortuitous for the society due to the sound fiscal policy of the women under Marie Kral of Chicago and Anna M. Veverka of Cleveland.

Jindrichuv Hradec castle buildings, located in the South Bohemian Region of the Czech Republic, is the 3rd largest historical castle complex in the Czech Republic. This complex was proclaimed a national cultural monument in 1996.

ST. NICHOLAS (SV. MIKULASE)

The feast of St. Nicholas (or sv. Mikulase) is enthusiastically celebrated in the Czech Republic. On the eve of the feast day, December 5th, St. Nicholas comes to visit children with both a devil and an angel to accompany him.



JOSEF LADA

St. Nicholas, dressed in a bishop's habit, first quizzes the children by asking them to recite poems or songs before asking them whether they have been naughty or nice. The devil is given the authority to scare them, while the beautiful angel counters his threats. Finally, St. Nicholas gives children a small gift, usually sweets and fruit, if they promise to be good. Disobedient children on the other hand, receive either a potato or a piece of coal. Children need not worry if they didn't see St. Nicholas. All they have to do is hang a stocking in the window and then after dark, St. Nicholas will come and fill it with presents.

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The Christmas Wafer

The word Bethlehem means "The House of Bread." The breaking of bread is a sign of charity, unity, and friendship. Religious family customs bring the truths of Faith into the home. One of these beautiful Christmas Eve customs is the Christmas Wafer. The thin Wafer bearing the Christmas characters is broken by the father as the head of the family and distributed to each member. With a simple prayer for God's grace and the welfare of the present and absent members of the family, the father breaks the Wafer and distributes it, a piece to each one at the table. While doing so he kisses each member of the family and wishes them a joyful feast. The members then greet one another in the same way.

The spiritual lesson in this age of old custom is the family, the main pillar of society. The bond of unity is the Christ-like charity that should exist amongst the members of the family. The father is the link in the unbroken chain of One Body, one Bread, one Christ and one Church. The family joins him in this eternal procession no matter where they are. For there is a universal longing by men to be always with one another with God.

All this brings to mind clearly our charity for one another, to seek salvation together. Family customs remind us that we seek and obtain salvation with the help of others at all times.

FRIEDRICH FIGNER



Friedrich Figner was born on December 2nd, 1866. He was a Czech-born entrepreneur, cinema and music pioneer mostly in South America. He was Jewish emigrant, who lived in the United States and landed in Brazil in 1891. Friedrich established the first commercial recording company in Brazil and also founded the

first Brazilian factory of phonograph records. In 1896, he filmed in Argentina what are now considered the first three films of the country. Friedrich Figner died on January 19, 1947.

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JOSEF LADA

Josef Lada, a Czech painter, illustrator and writer, was born on December 17, 1887 in Hrusice, Bohemia.

At the age of 14 he began to learn house painting and theater decorating. A year later he became an apprentice in the bookbinding trade in Prague. In 1906, he became a regular student at the Art and Industrial School. In 1907 Lada met Jaroslav Hasek whose novel, Good Soldier Svejk, he later illustrated. Between 1908 and 1940, his reputation grew not only in his native country, but abroad. His works were exhibited

in Paris, Vienna, Berlin, Geneva, Venice, Rome, Stockholm, Moscow and China.

Lada's lifelong focus on childhood experiences, children's outdoor games, fairy tales, animal stories, seasonal observations, traditional holidays and human follies, guarantees that his drawings will continue to be published.

In 1947, Lada was awarded the official rank of

"N a t i o n a l Artist" by the Czechoslovak government. Josef Lada died on December 14, 1957 in Prague and is buries at Olsany Cemetery.

CZECH SUPERSTITIONS



Some foods, plants and spices are closely linked with various superstitions. Garlic is believed to grant its eaters protection and strength, which is why Czechs do not forget to include garlic

in their Christmas dinner. People usually prepare a bowl of garlic and put it under their dinner tables.

A pot of honey is put under the dinner table, for it is believed that honey provides protection against evil forces. Eating mush-



rooms on Christmas will give you strength and health.

People dip bundles of grain in Holy Water

and they sprinkle them over their homes on Christmas Eve, for they believe this practice will prevent their homes from fires in the coming year.



VANOCNI STROM (CHRISTMAS TREE)

The first lighting of a Christmas tree was in 1812 in the Prague villa of the Theater of the Estates. Thirty years later, they were being sold commonly and were referred to as Christ's trees. They first caught on among wealthy Czech families and started appearing in Moravia around the turn of the 20th century. The custom made its way to the Czech lands from Germany, where



it had spread from town to town in the 17th and 18th centuries. In the 19th century and to the middle of the 20th century, Christmas trees were mainly fir. Nowadays, due to its scarcity, the trees are mainly the sturdier spruce and pine.

CHRISTMAS TRIVIA

The Statue of Liberty was given to the United States by the French on Christmas Day in 1886. The towering sculpture weighs a whopping 225 tons.

In 1914, during World War I, there was a Christmas truce in the trenches between the British and Germans. The two sides took it easy for a day and instead exchanged



gifts across a neutral no-man's land, played soccer and even decorated their shelters.

The tree traditional colors of most Christmas decorations are red, green and gold. Red generally stands for the blood of Christ, green symbolizes life and rebirth and gold represents royalty and wealth.

THE GOLDEN PIG

The Czech tradition of the Golden Pig, which is really the first star, represents the star of Bethlehem.

On Christmas Eve night, the family will



all gather around the table and stay standing for the traditional prayer which we say in Czech. Everyone is then seated except for Grandpa who remains standing to serve the soup, which begins the meal. Grandpa serves himself first, then Grandma and so on, until the voungest child is served. The older family members are served first, because they have been celebrating Jesus' birth longer than the children. It also is done to show respect to our elders. When all the family is served, an empty setting is placed for the zabracek, which is a poor person or orphan.

The placing of whiskey, honey, and krupicka (cream of wheat) is a must on the supper table, because they were gifts given to Jesus by the shepherds. The rest of the meal follows, which is fish, potatoes, corn, and varmuza (a soup made of green peas, raisins, and a prune sauce) along with a beverage such as beer or tea. After all the family is done with their meal, a bottle of whiskey is passed around the table for everyone to take a sip, to conclude the ritual.
