Establishing a Trust can simplify owning out-of-state property

Are you looking forward to spending time in your Florida home? Did you ever consider what would a happen with your out-of-state property if something happened to you? As people move around for work, school or recreation, they may come to purchase property outside of Ohio. It's important to understand how out-of-state property is handled upon death and what you can do now to provide direction and ease the process for loved ones.

Ancillary probate

Probate is the legal procedure for settling and transferring a person's estate, assets and debts. A state probate court only has authority and say over property in its jurisdiction so it can't issue orders for property in another state. Each state has its own rules regarding ancillary probate administration. In Ohio, ancillary probate is addressed in Chapter 2129 of the Ohio Revised Code. Typically, probate proceedings start in the County/State where the person resided (say Cuyahoga County, Ohio) and then a separate second (ancillary) probate is filed in the state where the other property is located (say Lee County, Florida). Ancillary administration is typically a shorter process then the administration in the county of the decedent's residence. Keep in mind that ancillary administration normally involves real estate, but may also be needed in the event a decedent had other property registered out of state, such as a boat, airplane or even livestock. This process can differ by state. Sometimes it's necessary to hire an attorney local to the out-ofstate property to assist with the process. Also, aspects like property size and location and where other family members are based can make ancillary probate costly and time-consuming. Having property in multiple states only adds complexity with various probate cases simultaneously occurring around the country.

An easier alternative


The ancillary probate process can be avoided, even if you own property in multiple states. One way is to transfer all out-of-state property before death such as through a joint tenant ownership in which the surviving owner absorbs the share of the decedent. Another option is to create a simple living trust to establish ownership of your real property along with any other assets you wish to include. A trust takes the property out of probate. The property remains in your name during life and avoids the probate process upon death because your successor trustee can just transfer it to your intended beneficiaries.





Are Passwords on their way out?

Passwords are a major part of our lives AND we have numerous (some say countless) amounts of them. They are the keys to our "electronic" locks. Trouble is, often times our keys are so easy to copy or guess, we might as well not have the locks!

Why do we need and have so many different passwords?

Because almost every one of the sites requiring a password has a different rule set for creating a password. Many require an uppercase character or a lowercase character or must have a number or must have a special character AND cannot be a password you have chosen in the past 45 years! Because we have so many sites where we need passwords, we try to make it

easy for us to remember them. However, if it's easy for us to remember, it's easy for the bad guys to guess. The most common passwords are: Password, Password123, admin, welcome, QWERTY, QWERTY1234, 123456, 111111 and 123123.

So what do many of us do with our passwords so we remember them? We write them down on sticky notes and keep them close to our computer! Or we write them in a notes area on our phone for easy reference. Worse yet, we tell our apps to simply remember them so when we use the app, the password is already there! Sure hope no one comes near your computer or sure hope you don't lose or misplace your phone.

So the trick is to come up with a way that is easy to remember your password and make it harder on "bad guys" so they don't break in. But bad guys know all the common passwords and have access to sophisticated software programs designed to "guess" your password. How can I, a simple human being, match wits with a computer? Let me demonstrate. It's a numbers game!

Let's make a simple password comprised of two numbers only. How many combinations of this password are there? In this example, we have a password length of 2 and we know that numbers consist of 0 through 9, hence 10 different numbers. So the formula is 10 to the 2nd power, 10 times 10 =100. There are 100 combinations.

Stay with me now, contrast that with a password consisting of two alphabetic characters only. Now how many combinations? There are 26 characters in the alphabet and we again have a password length of 2. So, mathematically, the formula is 26 to the 2nd power, 26 times 26 = 676. There are 676 combinations. Hence, a much harder password to guess.



Passwords comprised of alphabetic letters are much more difficult to guess than numeric numbers.

But computers can guess passwords at a vastly faster rate as they can perform millions of calculations every second. How can anyone outwit a computer? The answer is, are you ready, PassPhrases!

Yes a phrase is generally longer than a word and therefore is statistically, much more difficult to guess, even for a computer. So, if your PassPhrase is "TheBlueJacketsAreMyTeam", then using the formula described above, the chances of someone or some computer program guessing your password is 26 to the 23rd power (the password length is 23) yielding a 33 digit number, or one in 350,025,714,498,220,057,526,153,130,908,005 chances of guessing your password. WOW! Even our national debt is not that large.

Now, using "special characters" like the"!", "\$", "(", ")" and the scores of others, will also make it increasingly difficult to guess a password, but for the sake of brevity and explanation, I did not use them in this article.

In conclusion, use your longer (18-25 characters) PassPhrases for very important accounts like your bank and brokerage accounts and use slightly shorter (15-17 characters) PassPhrases for other not as important accounts like SATTELITE RADIO, FANTASY FOOTBALL or CABLE TV accounts. In all cases, try to use a PassPhrase consisting of at least 15 characters.

HOVEZI SEKANINA (BEEF LOAF)

3 lbs. of finely minced or ground beef¼ lb. of finely minced bacon3 heaping T. of grated bread crumbs soaked in milk3 beaten eggs

Mix together thoroughly. Add salt, pepper and sage. Grease a baking pan with butter. Form a loaf of the meat. Sprinkle grated breadcrumbs on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 2 ½ or 3 hours, basting occasionally with melted butter. May be served hot or cold.



AUTUMN PUMPKIN BREAD

1-½ cups sugar
1 cup canola oil
3 eggs, slightly beaten
1 (15 ounce) can pumpkin
3 cups flour (whole-wheat or white)
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon baking powder
½ teaspoon ground nutmeg
¾ teaspoon salt
½ cup chopped walnuts (optional)

Beat sugar and oil using electric hand mixer. Add eggs and pumpkin; beat lightly. Add all dry ingredients and mix well. Add nuts (if desired) and stir to mix. Divide batter between 2 loaf pans lightly sprayed with cooking spray. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes until done. Let cool and serve.

RUMOVA BAKBOVKA (BABA AU RUM) GRANDMA'S RUM CAKE

4 egg yokes
2 T. sugar
½ cup soft butter
3 cups flour, sifted with 1 t. salt & 2 t. baking powder
¾ cup warm milk
1 t. grated orange rind

Beat egg yolks, sugar and butter until thick and fluffy. Add flour and milk alternately. Continue beating. Add orange rind. Pour into greased bundt pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

Syrup mixture 1 cup sugar ½ cup water ½ cup orange juice 3 T. rum

Cook sugar with water to a heavy syrup. Add rum and orange juice. Remove cake from pan and pour syrup over while still hot. Let cool before cutting.




WENCESLAS SQUARE (Vaclavske Namesti)




HALLOWEEN COMES TO AMERICA



These new immigrants, especially the millions of Irish fleeing the Irish Potato Famine, helped to popularize the celebration nationally.



STATUE OF MARY ONCE AGAIN OVERLOOKS CITY OF PRAGUE



The Virgin Mary statue on top of a 55 feet column overlooks Prague's Old Town Square. It was erected in 1652 after Prague was spared at the end of the Thirty Years' War. WWI brought about the collapse of the Astro-Hungarian Empire. Bohemia became part of the indpendent country, Czechoslovakia in 1918. The next month, the column with the statue was toppled by a group of radicals. Shortly after the split of Czechoslovakia into the Czech Republic and Slovakia, sculptor Petr Vana started his campaign to restore the statue.

This past June, a replica of a historic statue of Mary was erected in Prague. The column was erected to "The singing of Marian songs, the ringing of bells on the tower of the Mother of God in front of Tyn Church and the applause of the people present."

PORK, SAUERKRAUT, AND DUMPLINGS



Give them the recipe for pork/dumplings/sauerkraut so they'll leave us in peace.

1 sparerib chopped in serving pieces or slices of pork shoulder 1 tsp. caraway seed 1 large can sauerkraut

Salt

Dumplings:

3 medium potatoes, grated Flour 1 egg 1 level Tbsp. salt

Put spareribs in roaster with tight fitting cover; add salt and caraway seed. Roast 1 hour at 375°. Add sauerkraut and 2 cups warm water and bake for another 30 minutes. In the meantime, grate potatoes; drain off the liquid. Add egg and 1 tablespoon salt. Beat, then add enough flour to make a dough that would form a dumpling when scooped with a spoon. Lower oven to 350°. Make indentations in the sauerkraut and place a large tablespoon of the dough on it. Repeat, placing dumplings next to each other. Cover. Roast for 30 minutes.

ANTONIN HOLY

Antonin Holy was a pioneering Czech scientist born on September 1, 1936. He specialized in the field of chemistry and cooperated on the development of important antiretroviral drugs used in the treatment of HIV and Hepatitis B. Antonin died in the Czech Republic on July 16, 2012.

JOSEF BICAN

Josef Bican was a Czech Austrian professional footballer, born on September 25, 1913 in Vienna, Austria. As a footballer, he played as a striker. Josef was considered one of the most prolific goal scorers of all time. He played from 1933-1949. It is estimated that he scored at least 762 goals. Josef Bican died on December 12, 2001 in Prague.



BOHEMIAN CROWN JEWELS




These jewels, sometimes called the Czech Crown Jewels (Ceske Korunovacni Klenoty), include the Saint Wenceslas Crown (Svatovaclavska Koruna), the coronation orb and sceptre from the first half of the 16th century, the coronation vestment of the Kings of Bohemia, the coronation cross, the

St. Wenceslas' sword and other artifacts. The jewels are locked, with seven locks, behind a studded door in the corner of the Saint Wenceslas Chapel in Saint Vitus Cathedral in Prague. The head of state holds one of the seven keys. The others are kept by the Prime Minister, the Archbishop of Prague, the chairmen of the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate, the representative of the Metropolitan Chapter and the Mayor of Prague. The most important item is the royal crown, which future King of Bohemia and Holy Roman Emperor Charles IV ordered for his coronation in September 1347. After his reign, it came to adorn the heads of another 21 kings and queens of Bohemia. The last of these was Habsburg Emperor Ferdinand V, known as Ferdinand the Good, who was crowned with it on September 7, 1836.

The crown jewels are only displayed on exceptional occasions such as an anniversary of the founding of Czechoslovakia, an anniversary of the birth of the Czech Republic or the election of a new president.



SLIVOVICE (PLUM BRANDY)



Czech slivovice is among the finest in the world, whether it's made in a distillery in Hana that dates back to 1518, or is made in the cellar and allowed to age. Plums are collected in the fall, set in barrels, and allowed to ferment naturally with just the yeast and the sugars in the fruit. In the spring, this mixture is distilled to 100% purity and send diluted to 50 percent alcohol by volume (ABV).

Nothing is added except water. This process requires a large amount of plums, and the climate and soil must be right so that the trees produce a lot of sweet fruit. The Hana region has become synonymous with dark rich soil, a bountiful harvest, and quality produce. It's the ideal region to produce slivovice. In fact, the slivovice from this area is a highly prized commodity which is treasured so much in the country that very few bottles make it out.

It's believed that a small shot every morning will kill bacteria and keep you healthy. It's widely recommended in the winter, with tea and honey. Among other claims, it's said that a little slivovice after fatty food will dissolve the fat and grease in your stomach. In some towns, visitors are welcomed with bread and salt and a shot of slivovice instead of wine.



MUSHROOMS IN CZECH CUISINE



Mushrooms-houby — is an ingredient that has a special place in Czech food.

You can't buy these mushrooms in the supermarket; they are field mushrooms or champignons, mainly several kinds of edible fungi, of the kind known as boletus — hrib.

Czechs are passionate mushroom pickers and many recognize dozens of edible mushrooms from which they can prepare all sorts of tasty meals.

The houbova smazenice — a mushroom stir fry, is a typical supper that people cook right after they've come back from the forest. You peel the mushrooms, slice them and fry them in butter, with salt, pepper and caraway seeds. Many people also add eggs into the mix.



Remove stems and wipe mushroom caps thoroughly. Cut squares of bread a little larger than mushrooms; butter squares and season with salt and pepper; sprinkle with parsley. Place mushroom caps on buttered squares of bread and heat in 350 degree oven for 5 minutes. Remove from oven and put a dab of butter on top of each. Return to oven and bake for an additional 15-20 minutes.

KAREL HASLER



Karel Hasler was a Czech actor, songwriter, film and theater director, composer and lyricist, born on October 31, 1879 in Prague. Karel studied to be a glove-maker, but became interested in theater at a young age. In 1902 he became a member of the Slovenian theater in Ljubljana, but soon moved back to Prague, where he joined the National Theatre. During World War I he began to appear in silent films, as an actor, director and author. Among his most successful film roles were the lawyer and deputy, Uher in the drama film Batalion (The Battalion, 1927), and the organist in Varhanik u sv. Vita (Organist at St. Vitus Cathedral, 1929). With the sound films coming out in the 1930s, Hasler was able to utilize his singing skills. His first sound film role Pisnickar (Balladeer, 1932), he sang patriotic songs Svoboda (Freedom) and Ta nase pisnicka ceska (Our Czech Song), among others. From 1932 to 1941 Hasler played in more than 13 films. In September 1941, he was arrested by the Gestapo and sent to the Mauthausen Concentration Camp. The main reason for his arrest was his patriotic songs. In Mauthausen, Karel Hasler was tortured to death and died on December 22,1941.


