A PASTOR'S COLUMN - OUR LADY OF LOURDES

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

The Flea Market is one of my favorite activities. It brings together people from the whole parish — European American as well as Latinos — and some of our neighbors. God blessed us with perfect weather. The folks that rented tables were very pleased with their sales, especially the many food stands that sold out! I am grateful to the Activities Committee of the Hispanic Community for organizing and facilitating the event.

I would like to share an anecdote from the Flea Market. I asked the parishioner that had about a dozen bicycles (most of which sold), tools, and various household items for sale where these things came from. Cynically, since he is an immigrant, and given the present anti-immigrant sentiment, I jokingly asked if he stole all of this. He laughed and told me no, but that people hire him to clean out their garage or basement and that the items that are in great or good condition he just cannot throw in the dump. In Mexico, he said, I never even dreamt of owning a bike - how could I throw all of these in the dump? The ensuing discussion leaves me with much to reflect on. The US culture is a culture of abundance and waste, and as Pope Francis so frequently said, a "throwaway" culture. Our immigrants come from a culture of survival. For as much as they are demonized at the present moment, thewwwy have so much to teach and inspire us. A blessing of the Flea Market and the theme of hospitality that emerged from last Sunday's readings is my own evaluation of how much I take for granted and waste. I am grateful to God for this discussion that challenges me in so many ways.









STAINED GLASS WINDOW OF 1930'S STYLE

The Lucerna Palace is an entertainment and shopping complex located in Wenceslas Square in the central district of Prague known as New Town (Nove Mesto). Constructed between 1907 and 1921 by Vacslav Havel (grandfather of former President of the Czech Republic, Vaclav Havel), it was originally intended to serve as a hockey stadium, but was reworked into a large social hall. At the time of its opening, it was one of the first reinforced concrete buildings in Prague.

In addition to its Great Hall, the complex also houses the Marble Hall, the Lucerna Music Bar, a movie theater, a café and a pedestrian walkway. It has been an important cultural and social centre in the former Czechoslovakia and the Czech Republic, housing concerts, balls, conferences, fashion shows and sporting events. Over time, some of the most prominent local and international artists have performed there. The complex has been listed as a cultural monument since 1976. In 2017, it was named a national cultural monument.

TOM STOPPARD

This Czech-born British playwright and screenwriter, whose original name is Tomas Straussler, was born on July 3, 1937 in Zlin, Czechoslovakia, but left as a child refugee fleeing imminent Nazi occupation. He settled with his family in Britain after the war in 1946, having spent the previous three years in a boarding school in the Indian Himalayans.

He has been a playwright of the National
Theatre and is one of the most
internationally performed dramatists of
his generation. He was knighted for his
contribution to theatre by Queen
Elizabeth in 1997.

Stoppard has co-written several screenplays including Shakespeare in Love (1998) and Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade (1989).

In 1998, Tom Stoppard returned to Zlin for the first time in over 50 years and currently resides there.





SCULPTURE OF MOSES

A Czech sculptor, artist and architect, Frantisek was born on November 6, 1872 in Chynov, a town in the South Bohemian Region of the Czech Republic. He designed numerous ceremonial objects and small sculptures for various congregations.

Frantisek Bilek died on October 13, 1941 in Chynov. He is buried with one of his own statues (Prayer Over the Grave 1905) serving as a monument. In his will, he expressed the wish that his villa be used for a museum. In1963, his widow donated the property and today there is a permanent exhibition. The family home was donated by his granddaughter and has been devoted to his works.




BILEK MUSEUM

COLD WAR MUSEUM MUZEUM STUDENE VALKY



This museum is in a former nuclear fallout shelter under the Jalta Hotel on Wenceslas Square in Prague. The hotel was built on a former residential building accidentally destroyed in 1945. Part of the shelter includes a surgery room. The Association of the Czechoslovak Armed Forces made a deal with the Jalta Hotel on having a Cold War Museum in the shelter. Exhibits tell the stories of the Communist Czechoslovakia, the Armed Forces and the Jalta Hotel. Some of the rooms are: Room of Border Guards, Room of Public Security, Spying Room and Operator Room. The museum is open for tours.



PRAGUE'S SAPA VIETNAMESE MARKET



Known as Little Hanoi, in the southeast corner of Prague, lies a hub for the third largest group of immigrants in the city, surpassed by Ukrainians and Slovaks. With an authentic market, people can sample the sights, sounds and various food offerings of Vietnam.

Through the winding streets of Prague's Old Town, you will hear of its history, legends, and local ghosts. Explore the lesser-known secrets of magical Prague. Learn about the dark side of the Golden City. Some of the sights and ghost stories: Old Town Square (27 noblemen), Astronomical Clock (Master Hanus), Tynsky Dvur (Turk with head in a box) Anezsky Klaster (nun's ghost), Liliova (headless Templar), St. James Church (the thief who lost his arm), Mala Stupartska (butcher with a flaming ax), House of the Golden Well (drowned maid, headless knight, and lady) Karlova (burning miser), Ovocny Trh (skeleton begging for money), Celetna (two prostitutes), Parizska (Jewish girl), Old Jewish Cemetery (Rabbi Low), Church of St. Martin in the Wall (the young woman whose father was executed). You will end the tour at a local hangman's pub near Old Town Square.



PERNSTEJN CASTLE






This castle is located in the South Moravian Region of the Czech Republic approximately 145 miles from Prague. It lies on a rock above the village of Nedvedice and the rivers Svratka and Nedvedicka. The castle came to be known as the marble castle because of the marble-like stone used to frame the doors and windows. Founded probably between `1270 and 1285, Pernstejn is one of the best preserved castles in the Czech Republic. This castle was never occupied by enemies. The different rooms contain weapons and hunting trophies along with wall and ceiling paintings. Due to the spooky atmosphere, Pernstejn Castle has been used as a backdrop of several movies including "Van Helsing" and "Joan of Arc".

PRAGUE METRONOME



This is a 75 feet tall kinetic sculpture in Letna Park, overlooking the Vltava River and the city center of Prague. This sculpture was erected in 1991 on the site left vacant by the late 1962 demolition of an enormous monument to the former Soviet leader, Joseph Stalin. Officially named "Time Machine", this metronome may be the largest in the world. The plaque at the base reads, "In time, all things pass." It is functional, but not always in operation. The definition of metronome is: a device that produces a regular sound or motion.



CZECH CULTURAL GARDEN



The Cleveland Cultural Gardens are a major part of the city's 254-acre Rockefeller Park. The land was donated to the city by oil magnate and philanthropist, John D. Rockefeller, in 1896. The Gardens were born in 1916 with the establishment of the Shakespeare Garden.

The Czech Garden was completed in 1935.

There are two full size statues of Jan Amos Komensky and Tomas Garrigue Masaryk, which stand in the middle of the garden. There are busts of Frantisek Palacky, Karel Havlicek Borovsky, Jindrich Simon Baar, Bedrich Smetana, Antonin Dvorak, Jan E. Purkyne, Bozena Nemcova and Dr. Miroslav Tyrs, which surround the pathway around the garden.

At the back of the garden is a monumental wall with a mural showing the arrival of Czech people in Bohemia and later in America.

JAN AMOS KOMENSKY



Born in the Margraviate of Moravia in the Bohemian Crown on March 28, 1592, Jan was a bishop and educator. He is considered the father of modern education. Komensky died in Amsterdam on November 15, 1670 and is buried in Naarden (the Netherlands).

TOMAS GARRIGUE MASARYK



Born in Hodonin, southeastern Moravia, on March 7, 1850, Tomas was a politician, statesman, sociologist and philosopher. As the first president of the Czechoslovak Republic, serving for 17 years, he worked tirelessly for the independence of his people and the establishment of the joint Czech and Slovak state. He was the Father

of Czechoslovakia. Masaryk died on September 14, 1937 in Lany, which is about 20 miles from Prague.

CZECH CULTURAL GARDEN, CONTINUED

FRANTISEK PALACKY



Born in Hodslavice, Moravia on June 14, 1798, Frantisek was a Czech historian and politician. He was the most influential person of the Czech National Revival, called "Father of the Nation." Palacky died in Prague on May 26, 1876.

JINDRICH SIMON BAAR



Born in Austria-Hungary on February 7, 1869, Jindrich was a Czech Catholic priest, realist, writer and author of the so-called country prose. As a priest, he strived, unsuccessfully, for reforms in the church. He earned his place in the hearts of Czechs with numerous novels describing life in the Bohemian countryside.

Baar died in Klenci pod Cerchovem, Czechoslovakia on October 24, 1925.

ANTONIN DVORAK



Born in Nelahozeves, a village on the Vltava River north of Prague on September 8, 1841, Antonin was the first Czech composer to achieve worldwide recognition, most notably for turning folk material into 19th century Romantic music. In 1892, he accepted the post of director of the

newly established National Conservatory of Music in New York. His many travels to the U.S. inspired many musical pieces, including "The New World Symphony" and "Slovanic Dances". The Cleveland Orchestra often performs his works. He returned to Prague in 1895. Dvorak died in Prague on May 1, 1904.

KAREL HAVLICEK BOROVSKY



Born in Borovia, Bohemia, Austrian Empire on October 31, 1821, Karel was a writer, poet, critic, politician, journalist and publisher. As a journalist, he was a "liberal natlonalist" politically, but refused to allow a "party line" to inform his opinions. He used his talents to educate Czech people about freedom and democracy. His intellectual

fight for freedom earned him a lasting recognition in national history. Borovsky died in Prague, Bohemia, Austrian Empire on July 29, 1856.


BEDRICH SMETANA



Born in Litomysl, east of Prague, on March 2, 1824, Bedrich was a Bohemian composer known for his operas and symphonic poems. He is considered the father of Czech music and the founder of the Czech School of Music. In his later years he became completely deaf leading to a mental collapse early in 1884 which led to his incarceration in an

asylum. Smetana died in Prague on May 12, 1884.

JAN E. PURKYNE



Born in the Kingdom of Bohemia, then part of the Austrian monarchy, now the Czech Republic, on December 17 or 18, 1787, Jan was a Czech anatomist, physiologist and one of the best-known scientists of his time. In 1839, he coined the term "protoplasma" for the fluid substance of a cell. Purkyne died in Prague, Austria-Hungary on July 28, 1869.

CZECH CULTURAL GARDEN, CONTINUED

BOZENA NEMCOVA

Born in Vienna on February 4, 1820, Bozena was a Czech writer of the final phase of the Czech National Revival Movement. She is best known for her novel, Babicka, (The Grandmother), first published in 1855, which is considered a classic of Czech literature for its portrayal of rural village life through the eyes of a young girl.

Nemcova died in Prague on January 21, 1862.

DR. MIROSLAV TYRS



Born in Decin, a city in the Usti nad Labem Region of the Czech Republic on September 17, 1832, Miroslav was a Czech philosopher, art historian and co-founder of the Sokol Movement. Sokol, meaning Falcon, was founded in 1862. The founders believed that a nation must be physically fit, moral and intelligent to secure its independence and retain it.

He went to Otztal alpine valley in Austria on holiday in the summer of 1884 and was declared dead on August 8, 1884. Tyrs' body was found thirteen days later in the Otztaler Ache River in Austria.

MORINA

This is a municipality and village in Beroun District in the Central Bohemian Region of the Czech Republic, which is about 9 miles southwest of Prague. It lies on the border between the Horovice Uplands and Prague Plateau. The highest point is the Vyska hill at 1,394 feet above sea level.





The name Morina is derived from the Slavic goddess Morana. Morina is known for Velka Amerika, a former limestone quarry with a pair of lakes on the bottom. The quarry is 2,600 feet long, 660 feet wide and up to 330 feet deep, with two lakes about 59 feet deep each on the bottom.

Thus, Morina is nicknamed "Czech Grand Canyon."



RED WINE CRANBERRY SAUCE

2/3 c. sugar

¾ c. dry red wine

½ cinnamon stick (optional)

12 oz. fresh cranberries (about 3 cups)

2 long strips tangerine or orange zest (optional)

In saucepan over medium heat, combine sugar, wine and cinnamon. Bring to boil. Reduce heat to medium-low, simmer, stirring occasionally till sugar dissolves (about 4 minutes). Add berries. Simmer till berries soften and sauce thickens (about 10-12 minutes). Remove from heat. Remove cinnamon if used. Set aside to cool for at least several minutes and up to several hours. Serve warm or at room temperature. Notes: May substitute pomegranate juice for the wine, but then increase sugar to ¾ cup. The sauce may be made and refrigerated up to 2 weeks in advance.

BACON WRAPPED TURKEY

Approximately 12# turkey 12 slices bacon 10 small fresh rosemary sprigs Butter mixture – Combine together: ½ c. unsalted butter, softened

2 t. smoked paprika

2 t. minced fresh garlic

2 t. finely chopped fresh rosemary

1 T. finely chopped fresh sage leaves

1 t. finely chopped fresh thyme

1 ½ T. lemon juice

Preheat oven to 500 degrees. Clean turkey. Loosen the skin. Rub all but about 2 T. of the butter mixture under the skin. Tie turkey with butcher's twine. Place turkey breast side up on rack in pan. Roast about 15 minutes. Use basting brush to spread rest of butter mixture on turkey. Continue to roast until skin is golden brown (about 10 minutes). Remove from oven and reduce heat to 350 degrees. Turn turkey over. Add bacon slices, using rosemary sprigs to hold in place. Return to oven. Turkey should be done in about 2 hours, though ovens vary. If getting too brown, cover loosely with foil. After removing from oven, wait 20 minutes before carving.

BEEF-NOODLE-MUSHROOM CASSEROLE HOVEZI-NUDLOVY-HOUBY KASTROL

About ¼ c. each of onion, celery and green peppers ½ pint fresh cleaned mushrooms

1 lb. ground beef

1/4 lb. ground pork

Saute vegetables in butter. Add the 2 meats. Cook until meat is tender. Add 1 pint canned tomatoes or tomato juice. In a casserole, alternate meat mixture with cooked noodles. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour or until heated through and a crust forms on top. Note: Broad noodles work the best, just follow directions on package.




TIC TAC TOE

Another theory being it is like a cat chasing its tail, constantly moving in circles without ever winning.


